A trained archivist with a passion for young adult literature is the newest library director for the Hillsdale Community Library.

Cory Grimminick (pronounced "Grimmick") started her position Monday and, after spending much of her career in big cities, is happy to return to a small-town atmosphere similar to her hometown of Grand Haven.

"I'm from a relatively small town," she said. "I miss the small-town atmosphere."

Grimminick holds a Bachelor of Arts degree in English from the University of Chicago and a masters degree in library science from Simmons College in Boston.

The 37-year-old started her career in books in New York City working as a publicity assistant for HarperCollins Publishers.

"It was nice to meet all the authors I've always loved," she said. During her four and a half years at

During her four and a half years at HarperCollins, Grimminick worked her way up to senior publicist, meeting famous writers including Katherine Paterson, Judy Blume and Maurice Sendak. In New York, Grimminick realized her passion and interest in library science and moved to Boston for graduate school. It was in Boston where Grimminick joined the World Library

archivist passion for dult literatest library e Hillsdale Partnership's "Inform the World" program, that travels to rural communities to set up libraries. Through this program, Grimminick traveled to South Africa for six weeks to help set up a library, only a few years after the end of apartheid.

"The amazing thing about being there was that we toured government buildings with a mixed group of whites and blacks," she said. "The blacks in our group kept telling us that just five years ago, they would have been arrested for even going near the building."

Most recently, Grimminick has worked in Michigan at both the Kent District Library in Wyoming, Mich. and then in Kalamazoo working as the youth librarian and lead librarian of teen services respectively.

Now the library director in Hillsdale, Grimminick hopes to use her background in publicity and libraries to reach more people to attract them to books.

"I've always dreamt to combine my love of libraries with my marketing background," she said. "I think it's a great library. One of my focuses would be outreach and just really see what kind of partnerships we can do. I want to see who's not coming (to the library) and see what we can do to make it worth their while."
